McNaughton's Nurseries: A new, colorful job site

"They're lifesavers!" says Keith, an employee of McNaughton's Nurseries. He's talking about Kingsway students Bryan C., Jacob S. and Connor D. who, under the supervision of Job Coach Theresa Monaco, put in a solid day's work in just a few hours at this recently added Community Based Instruction job site.

"They come in, we give them a job to do and they get right to it," continues Keith.

This new job site introduces students to a number of tasks, including watering plants, weeding, sprucing up the indoor shop and unloading plants from delivery trucks. On this day, mismatched or incomplete flats of flowers are sorted to make complete flats. It's warm in the greenhouse where the students are working, but they focus, listen to Ms.

Monaco's instructions and get busy.

"It's a good job," says Jacob,17.
"We do lots of different things. It's not boring."

Michelle, the self-described "do everything girl" at the nursery, enjoys having Kingsway's students at McNaughton's. "They work really hard and do a great job. I'm amazed at how much they get done in such a short time. And it's great to see the sense of accomplishment on their faces."

Kingway students attended the 2019 Dare to Dream Conference on May 31st held at Salem County Community College. This year marked the fifth year that students in the secondary program attended the Dare to Dream student leadership conference hosted by the New Jersey Department of Education, Office of Special Education.

This conference is held annually at various locations throughout the state and this was the first year the conference was held in Salem County. Kingway students were honored and excited to participate.

Three students Connor, Nicole and Nisa helped facilitate a workshop titled "Fill Your Emotional Cup With All You Need to Succeed." This interactive session included a combination of thought-provoking activities related to identity development, feelings and needs identification, goal setting, asking for help, and self-care planning to assist in fostering self-esteem and improving well-being.

Each conference features keynote presentations from accomplished students and young adults with disabilities who have demonstrated exemplary self-advocacy and leadership skills. The conference includes a variety of concurrent workshop sessions that provide conference attendees opportunities to gain insight into the transition from school to adult life. It gives students the opportunity to participate in workshops led by their peers on topics such as self-discovery, student self-advocacy, learning styles, developing career paths and understanding rights and
