ROAD TRIP! Adult Day Program ventures out to explore history and art

There is nothing like a firsthand experience--seeing something for yourself, getting a sense of a place. Several clients and staff at Kingsway's Adult Day Program set out to Atlantic City in January to visit the African American Heritage Museum to learn about the contributions of African Americans to our society and culture.

On this day, six clients, accompanied by Scott Flovin, Program Manager, and Gisela Lorde, Direct Support Professional (DSP), visited the small but impressive museum located in the Noyes Arts Garage of Stockton University. Clients saw exhibits of family photos dating back to the turn of the century, tools, kitchen utensils, clothing, artwork, and historical and cultural documents.

"It was wonderful to learn more about the history of African Americans in the United States," says Mr. Flovin, "and especially wonderful to see an exhibit dedicated to African American history within South Jersey."

Holiday Inn Express: a good neighbor and job site

Within walking distance of Kingsway's School Program in Voorhees, Holiday Inn Express is an excellent job site for students in the Community Based Instruction (CBI) Program. The tasks are varied, giving students the opportunity to work on different skills.

On this day, Jordan DiMedio, Job Coach, guides students Danielle and Arthur through their work day. They start in the guest dining area and breakfast buffet.

Danielle meticulously sweeps under and around the dining tables. Once done, it's on to the buffet area. While she restocks the refrigerator with yogurt, Arthur restocks plates, napkins, and plastic utensils on the buffet line. When everything is filled, both students wipe down the countertop and move on with their work.

Danielle leads the way to the conference room. She and Arthur

politely greet hotel employees as they make their way down the hall. Once in the room, the two students get busy wiping down tables, stacking chairs, vacuuming, and setting the chairs back into place.

"They know what needs to be done and they get right to it," says Mr. DiMedio. "Sometimes they need a little reminder, but they work hard here and enjoy getting their tasks done."

Once the conference room is clean and straightened, the workout room is next. Armed with their disinfecting wipes, Danielle cleans the treadmill, elliptical trainer and stationary bicycle. Arthur wipes down the free weights.

IN THE CLASSROOM

Q & A: What's happening in Mr. Murtha's class?

February's "In the Classroom" features Teacher Jim Murtha's Elementary class--10 students ranging in age from 5 to 8 years of age.

+ How does your class start the day?

Our students hit the ground running when they first arrive at school. After they unpack their backpacks and take-home folders, they each work on their individualized morning work folders.

They trace their names, match name letters, or pull name letters from a simulated keyboard, depending on their skill levels determined by our occupational and speech therapists. They work on pre-handwriting skills, as well as theme-based worksheets which introduce the day's activities.

+ Would you explain the morning "centers" routine?

We have a three-center rotation each morning. Students work individually or in pairs in three of the following areas: Dramatic Play, Fine Motor, Art, Reading, or Math. The centers are in a set order and the students rotate their starting center each day so that by the end of the week, they have had each center at least three times.

+ What is the students' favorite part of the day?

They really like morning meeting. It's a chance to work on social skills and the information of the day (date, weather, season, how we feel that morning). We use music and movement to get everybody ready for the day. Our songs change each month, then at the end of the year, our June meeting is a "greatest hits," revisiting staff and student favorites!

+ What is your favorite part of the day?

I was always a science geek, so I love our afternoon small group science projects--mixing things together, getting outside to explore, figuring out how to make something float or fly. Even when the experiments don't turn out quite as expected, it's such a great lesson in determination and perseverance.
